What attracted your interest to IPSG?

My major interests have focused on hip disorders in children both clinically and in my research. In my PhD thesis I focused on the etiological and psychosocial aspects of Perthes disease. To improve the quality of outcome for children with Perthes Disease I was part of the establishment of a national quality register for Perthes Disease in Sweden. Being actively involved in an international multicenter study was a great opportunity.

What would you say is the most challenging part of treating Perthes Disease?

The most challenging part of treating Perthes Disease is to treat it before the deformation of the femoral head develops. This means we need to find ways to diagnose in early stages.

What would you like to see accomplished through annual IPSG meetings?

Many studies are based on small numbers of patients, which makes it hard to draw conclusions. The IPSG study gives a unique possibility for high quality research on a large cohort all over the world.
